

WINE & STEIN WARM COLORS

Simple Techniques - Stunning Effects



MATERIALS

C01902 Large Stein
DB37200 Wine Glass
Fan Brushes

COLORS

Stein:

EL 125 - Sahara Sands EL 128 - Wheat EL 145 - Ginger Root

Wine Glass: EL 127 – Rose Granite EL 133 – Autumn



INSTRUCTIONS

These pieces would look gorgeous painted with any of the Elements glazes. We chose these for their warm tones.

Stein:

- 1. Paint the top half of the outside of the mug and handle with a generous coat of Shara Sands.
- 2. Next, paint from the bottom ring of the outside of the mug (and handle) up to the Sahara Sands with a generous coat of Wheat. Allow it to overlap with the Sahara Sands.
- 3. Stir up Ginger Root with the back of your paint brush to loosen the crystals on the bottom. Paint the bottom section of the mug with Ginger Root allowing it to come up over the ring and overlap with the Wheat.
- 4. Repeat steps 1-3 again.
- 5. Paint the inside of the mug with 2 heavy coats of Wheat.
- 6. Finally, paint the bottom of the mug with 2 heavy coats of Wheat.

Wine Glass:

- 1. Paint the top half of the outside of the glass with a generous coat of Rose Gold.
- 2. Next, paint the bottom half of the glass with a generous coat of Autumn. Allow it to overlap with the Rose Gold.
- 3. Repeat steps 1-3 again.
- 4. Paint the inside of the glass with 2 heavy coats of Autumn.
- 5.. Finally, paint the bottom of the glass with 2 heavy coats of Autumn

These pieces will not get dipped into clear glaze so make sure to cover all of the white pottery with glaze.

Due to the organic nature of this product, each one will look different, that's the beauty of it!

TIPS

- This isn't going to be dipped into clear glaze, make sure to cover all of the pottery.
- The amount of paint that goes on will effect the color, we did 2 generous coats.
- No two will look the same due to the organic nature of this paint, that's what makes it so
- The color will change drastically in firing, it's okay that it's red/brown!
